1983 California CSD became a Region with 184 branches and over 27,000 members. The VanGogh "Irises" sold for 53.9 million; Nat'l Museum of Women in the Arts opened in D.C.; the Dow Jones went over the 10,000 mark for the first time and we suffered through the Columbine School incident.

In our branch the speakers were still a vital part of the general meetings program and the sections were in full swing and for a good part of the time the Baby-sitting Co-op was a vital section. For some years we had the English Spode China sale accompanied by a nice cup of tea, the annual Christmas party with cookies and recipes and the marvelous very British salad Lunhceon concluding the end of the year's book section. Everyone wore hats, gloves, medals of rank and of course the very elegant lady Sue Cheek 'pouring'. And you imagine we had a speaker in the early 80's that taught us just what to do in case of an earthquake!! Are you still not prepared?? A group of members begin to monitor the County Board of Supervisors; we attended the Legislative Days in Sacramento and were awed by the amount of legislative speakers as well as the obvious respect given AAUW. We now had our own legislative

Sacramento.

Public Policy:

Fair Pay Restoration Act

AAUW members have been very supportive of the Fair Pay Restoration Act (S.1843). However, AAUW asks you to take action on this legislation again to show a critical mass of support at this time and send a strong signal to your senators that pay discrimination will not be tolerated

The Supreme Court's decision in the Ledbetter v. Goodyear case in May severely limited the victims of pay discrimination to sue under Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The Fair Pay Restoration Act restores the law to how it was previously applied to be consistent with Congress' intent.

Although the wage gap has narrowed over the years, success in closing the gap remains elusive and the Supreme Court's recent decision in the Ledbetter v. Goodyear case will make it even more difficult for women workers and employees of color to close the wage gap.

Educational Foundation:

Did you know the AAUW Educational Foundation recently received an award? The Independent Charities of America recognized our Foundation as one of the best non-profit organizations in America for meeting the high standards of public accountability and program effectiveness.

The Foundation has a distinguished history of advancing educational an professional opportunities for women in the US and around the globe. One of the world's largest sources of funding for graduate women, the Educational Foundation provided more than 250 fellowships, grants and special awards to outstanding women in the 2007 -08 academic year. EF provided a total of \$4.1 million this year as we continue our efforts to support women.

Legal Advocacy Fund

The Legal Advocacy Fund is currently supporting 18 cases. 100% of LAF contributions are used toward the implementation, administration and support of LAF programming. Keep a lookout for the release of LAF's newest research report scheduled for publication in the next couple of months. The report examines complaints of sexual harassment filed with the Dept of Ed Office for Civil Rights (OCR) by students from higher education institutions and studies OCR's response to those complaints.

What have we done lately on behalf of all women and girls?

- When the Dept of Education established a commission that threatened to dismantle the enforcement provisions of Title IX, the law banning sexual discrimination in education, AAUW mobilized a nationwide outcry to help protect this landmark civil rights law.
- We awarded over \$4 million in grants and fellowships to over 250 extraordinary women for the 2006-07 academic year.
- We represented women and girls by protecting Social Security from privatization, promoting a fair and independent judiciary, and advocating for full funding of the NO Child Left Behind Act, improved student aid in the Higher Education Act, and better gender equity provisions in the Perkins Vocational Education Act.
- In 2006 we published our nationally acclaimed research: <u>Drawing the Line:</u>
 <u>Sexual Harassment on Campus</u>, followed in 2007 by <u>Behind the Pay Gap</u>, the report that brought pay equity to the forefront, showing that just one year out of college, women working full time already earn less than their male colleagues, even when they work in the same field.
- And our branches carry this work to the grassroots- thousands of programs every year are held throughout America, again, with the goal of promoting education and equity.

Since its first meeting in 1881, the AAUW women have been a catalyst for change. Today, with approximately 100,000 members, more than 1,000 branches, and 500 college/university partners committed to education and equity, AAUW members across the country contribute to a more promising future and provide a powerful voice for women and girls – a voice that cannot and will not be ignored **You strengthen that voice.**
