willing to fill positions and do the work needed to carry the branch and its programs forward.



#### **Report From Convention, '08**

#### It's All About the Mission

With a lovely 3 ring binder, covered with a picture of 2 women walking down the breezeway of what I assume is Mission San Francisco Solano (in Sonoma), I entered my first meeting and could already feel the energy. Friday afternoon had been set aside for a presidents' gathering where we really heard "It's all about the Mission."

......The AAUW California leadership expected us all to take every opportunity to participate, dialogue with each other, make new acquaintances, and actively be a part of the decision making process. Following that road, we went straight from the presidents' meeting to a Bylaws briefing. There was only one amendment, really just housekeeping, creating a transition to the new board structure. There seemed to be no contention to the amendment, but there was contention over the election. Members were concerned that there had been no vitas sent to the branches in advance to review and receive comments from the branches on how delegates should vote.

The rest of the evening was for dinner, business session one at which candidates were introduced and nominations were taken from the floor, then a meet and greet to get a chance to ask questions of individual candidates. Sixteen were to be elected and there were 17 candidates.

...... Saturday started with Charlotte Newhart, AAUW CA Public Policy Advocate, giving a synopsis of what's in front of the legislature right now and what AAUW is supporting. I have given all the information to our own Shirley Thompson who will keep you up-to-date. The one thing I remember is that AAUW CA is sponsoring a bill to reduce the lead in lipstick. Europe has outlawed lead in cosmetics for the past 20 years. Frightening. ..... On to the Saturday morning plenary with speakers from the California Commission on the Status of Women, the Women's Bureau, U.S. Department of Labor, AARP, CA NOW, and the National Women's Political Caucus. As always, I sat in awe, trying to absorb as much as possible. The big things that come up, of course, deal with the huge % in all industries and the government who will be retiring soon. 60,000 in 2009 alone.

There are more and more older women, though, who are choosing to stay in the workforce. They want (and are getting) flexible scheduling and other perks for their knowledge and expertise.

......The meat and potatoes of any convention are the workshops. With 5 to choose from each session, it was difficult for me to spread myself out. (Hint, hint for next year). I chose "Making the Mission Matter in Your Community" and you will all be hearing more about that in the near future. Lunch was a very moving presentation by Paul Thein, Legal Advocacy Fund litigant, formerly of Feather River Community College. And then on to another workshop. Keeping with my own theme, I went to TEAM: Together, Everyone Achieves the Mission. Besides the mission, we reviewed the value promise: "By joining AAUW, you belong to a community that breaks through educational and economic barriers so that all women have a fair chance."

Catherine Hill, AAUW Director of Research encouraged us to strengthen our lobbying efforts, use the research to spark discussions, and become a spokesperson for AAUW. She also was taking suggestions for more research, so if you have any ideas be sure to let us know.

.....All that was left was to listen to Ms. Leigh Henderson of the Leadership Training Room, encourage us to demonstrate the six key traits that are the foundation of effective leadership. And she is not talking about elected officers. She is talking about all members of AAUW – this means you! – and their leadership in their communities.

.....Sunday morning new officers were installed and we listened to Mary Perry, Deputy Director of Ed Source, give the key points to the state budget and how it is affecting education.

.....In keeping with the aging of our membership (or maybe because they have always been a big sponsor of AAUW), AARP had a full page ad on the back of the binder, promoting the website DividedWeFail.org. More action. More advocacy. .....I hope all of you are gearing up for a very active, involved year with PH-AAUW. Your dues supported my trip to this convention and I expect each of you to make sure that I fulfill whatever expectations you when you pay those dues. But I can't do it alone. It is the responsibility of each of us to "...advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, and research" and to make the value promise to many more women and men who want to help further our mission as we make them a promise that by joining AAUW (they) belong to a community that breaks through educational and economic barriers so all women have a fair chance."

# Public Policy: California Budget Crisis

The projected California budget deficit is 16 thousand million through the end of 2009, according to Legislative Analyst Elizabeth Hill.

AAUW has been a staunch supporter of education for 126 years. We have worked hard to build education budgets that reduce class size, increase accountability and improve performance.

No department, program or service will be spared in the proposals from Sacramento. Healthcare cuts will deny access to millions of working poor including children who attend school and may come when ill. The release of more than 20,000 inmates from state prisons may occur and 20% of state parks will close. Roads and bridges will not be upgraded.

AAUW California urges a reasoned well thought out approach to include:

- Protect the basic education and human services infrastructure.
- Maintain all health and safety standards.
- Insert provisions to ensure periodic review of programs, services and taxes/fees for redundancies & inefficiencies.
- Equitably distribute funding cuts.
- Seriously assess the options for tax and fee increases.
- Restructure the educational funding system. Establish an education commission charged to formulate and recommend measures to the legislature.
