# The Value Promise and a New Direction for LAF

It's not uncommon knowledge that the way in which the AAUW will fund cases with contributions to the Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF) has already changed. But it's hard to know just how excited we should be.

In February 2008, the AAUW Board decided to expand LAF to include sex discrimination in all workplaces to reflect our commitment to that fair chance. We will be expanding our ability to participate as *amicus curiae* in cases affecting women's rights. We will seek expanded friend-of-the-court opportunities in cases of discrimination that disadvantage women in the workplace.

We will have a few challenges in the year to come: ironing out the criteria for funding a case, which non-profits we will work with, raising money under the new value promise, or even understanding what the impact of our new direction may be.

I am enthusiastic about the prospect of expanding our horizons and maximizing the strategic impact of our investment in LAF. Keeping in mind our **new value promise** — that we belong to a community that breaks through educational and economic barriers so **all** women have a fair chance.

My personal challenge will be initiating the discussion of this exciting strategic expansion and **helping branch members to see the value** in these sweeping changes.

### Things that will not change:

- $\bullet$  LAF will continue to be a 501 c (3) and all donation will be tax deductible
- The Gloria Weston Fund can still receive monetary contributions
- The Campus Outreach Program will continue with their educational initiatives, and will expand their efforts
- State-specific contributions can still be requested For those concerned with the current California plaintiffs, our plaintiffs will be getting their last round of money in January of 2009. However, after the distribution of money collected year-end 2008, LAF will no longer directly financially support new plaintiffs and will phase out support of current plaintiffs.

There's still much work to be done, and issues to sort through. As things get further clarified at a national level, I will be using this column to clarify any significant changes or announcements. And we will still be raising money for LAF, most likely in Spring 2009.
