While AAUW celebrates the fact that women have made remarkable strides in education and the labor force during the past four decades, these gains have yet to translate into full equity in pay ~ even for college-educated women who work full time. In these tough economic times, when more and more families are counting on a woman's salary to make ends meet, fair pay is even more critical, not simply to family economic security but also to the nations' economic recovery. Urge your senators to take the next critical step in the fight for pay equity by quickly passing the **Paycheck Fairness Act (S. 182).**

Reproductive rights supporters and opponents marked the 37th anniversary of the U. S. Supreme Court's landmark *Roe vs. Wade* decision on Friday with marches and rallies across the nation. AAUW supports the right of every woman to safe, accessible, affordable, and comprehensive family planning and trusts that every woman has the ability to make her own informed choices regarding her reproductive life within the dictates of her own moral and religious beliefs. URGE your members of Congress to protect women's reproductive rights as the health care debate continues.

PHIG Background: Volunteers can make a difference, and a former scrap of wasteland can become a haven for plants, animals and the community, with the good will and work of many people. Students of the Gardening Program of Mt. Diablo Adult Education, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Contra Costa Master Gardeners, DVC's adaptive horticulture class, and other interested volunteers and neighbors teamed up with the City of Pleasant Hill and the Contra Costa Central Sanitary District to begin the initial phase of creating a beautiful and waterconserving garden at the Pleasant Hill Education Center on Santa Barbara Road. The budding young garden is located behind the Pleasant Hill Library and across from the Pleasant Hill Middle School. It was used as a parking lot; it's becoming a lovely demonstration garden and a learning opportunity using healthy garden practices (no pesticides), water conservation and recycling methods, and drought-tolerant and native plantings.
