❖ Thanks to a grant from CCRF (California Coalition for Reproductive Freedom), we now have an additional communication tool available for member use. The new Action Alert system can inform AAUW members that bills on which AAUW CA has taken a position are coming up for a vote and enable sending messages to our legislators. If you are already registered for the AAUW Washington Action Alert you are automatically registered for the AAUW CA program. Not signed up? You can also register for Action Alert at the state website, www.aauw-ca.org

Because legislators prefer to hear only from their constituents, the people who can potentially vote them out of office, the system is set up to provide a direct communication with your Assembly Member and Senator. Your zip code, entered when you register, identifies your legislator. You can use information provided on the Alert to help you write an email message expressing your position on a pending bill, and send it directly to your legislator. It will be especially important for AAUW members to act when a bill is in a Senate or Assembly committee for a vote, since only constituents of the committee members can use this system for direct email contact with their legislators. (Nonconstituents can send letters via fax or make phone calls).

Register for Action Alert, stay informed, and take part in AAUW's Advocacy efforts!

❖ AAUW celebrated Mother's Day by joining with coalition partners to bring you a funny Mother of the Decade award video that also stressed the importance of fair pay for all women. For Father's Day, the men of AAUW spread the message about the importance of pay equity for women in their lives and for our country in general. You can keep the momentum going by urging your senators to continue the fight against wage discrimination by acting swiftly on the Paycheck Fairness Act and by adding AAUW's Pass the Paycheck Fairness Act web stickers to your website, blog, or social networking profiles.

- ❖ AAUW signed an amicus brief for Christian Legal Society v. Martinez, and the case was argued before the U. S. Supreme Court on April 19. The court will decide whether or not the University of California Hastings College of Law may deny school funding to a religious student organization because the group requires its officers and voting members to agree with its religious viewpoints. Gay and lesbian students were specifically barred from the group. AAUW joins other amicus signers in supporting the school, the separation of church and state, and religious liberty. A ruling is due by the end of June.
- ❖ Surfing AAUW.org As this issue of N.E.W.S. goes to "press", leaders of world nations (mostly male) are gathered together in Toronto, Canada, for the Group of 20 or G20 summit. They will focus on economic recovery and financial reforms, issues similar to, but not quite the same as, those covered last week at the G(IRLS) 20 SUMMIT, which focused on issues most relevant to the 3.3 billion women and girls in the world.
 Organizers called the summit "the start of a global conversation about the economic prowess of girls and women." For two days the

global conversation about the economic prowess of girls and women." For two days the 21 G(IRLS)20 delegates (one teenage girl from each of the G20 countries and one girl from the African Union) participated in several discussions about the topics of education, child and maternal health, and economic opportunity, which are focus areas of the UN's Millennium Development Goals. Then the girls created tangible solutions to these challenges that face women and girls around the world. Now the delegates have taken the recommendations they created as a group back to their own countries for implementation as voices for positive change. I have listened to Charlotte at various times over the past 6 or 7 years and always come away refreshed and ready for action. Her wry sense of humor in what can be a very dry (and, these days, depressing) subject inspires us to make our voices heard in the state legislative process. She gives sound advice on current legislation and follows that with specific ways for us to follow through. For example, we "must make sure to let them (legislators) know you are a constituent and a voter." We must "help on campaigns" for the people who work for our issues. We can even hold meetings to brainstorm ideas of how we would solve the budget crisis. "People of values must stand up for those values." Thank you, PHAAUW, for making this event possible for me.
