

The Local Scholarships Committee is pleased to announce the four recipients of the PHAAUW \$500 scholarships for 2010. There were nine applicants and from them we chose two young women from DVC and two from College Park HS. The DVC winners are *Kajal Shahali and Latoiche Adams*.

Kajal is Iranian. She came to the US without her parents when she was 17. She plans to attend Berkeley pursuing peace and conflict studies. She has worked full time while attending DVC and hopes to continue her education through Graduate School in the east where she can be close to the UN.

Latoiche has been accepted at Sacramento State where she plans to pursue a degree in Social Work. She lives in Vacaville and is raising two sons. Due to personal problems and the children it has taken her 5 years to complete her work at DVC. She is a student in the Extended Opportunity Programs and Services program at DVC. She is very motivated and goal oriented.

PUBLIC POLICY - Marlene Maksel

It is an honor for AAUW that Senator Fran Pavley has asked AAUW to co-sponsor SB 929 ~ a bill that would ban Cadmium from children's jewelry. This bill would protect toddlers and young children from Cadmium, a toxic metal found increasingly in children's jewelry.

Since lead was banned as toxic, Cadmium has increasingly been replacing lead in jewelry, particularly in products coming from China.

According to the Consumer Products Safety Commission, Cadmium does not have to be ingested by children for them to be exposed to the metal. Biting or sucking on the jewelry item can result in high levels of exposure to the element. It is No. 7 on the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's priority list of 275 most hazardous substances in the environment.

Cadmium is associated with potential developmental deficiencies, including delayed sensory-motor development, hormonal effects and altered behavior.

Please let your State Senator know of our concerns!
