

The new Walnut Creek Library opened on July17, 2010 at a cost of \$39.9 million. Over 8,500 people visited the library on the first day. A model of "green practices", it received awards for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design. Softball is just starting and we are in the process of trying to get schedules for the girls' events at College Park and Alhambra High Schools. Would you be interested in supporting our local female athletes by attending a softball game?? I will be sending out a schedule as soon as I have them.

In March, we heard Sr. Caritas Foster speak on Human Trafficking. We all know bits and pieces of this dreadful crime, but Sr. Caritas brought it closer to home when she said BART is a great recruiting ground. Other cases of indentured servitude have happened in our county. The problem seems overwhelming. but Sr. Caritas said if we ALL do one small thing, it will make a difference. We can use our dollars to support safe house and shelters for trafficked persons ~ they can use BART cards, gift cards for clothing, telephone cards, etc. If you are a person who "has everything," and doesn't know what to tell your loved ones to get you for your birthday, Christmas, etc., tell them to give you a gift card that you will then pass on. Also, buy fair trade products ~ a really easy way to provide a living wage for those involved in the coffee, tea and candy trade. Above all, keep your eyes and ears tuned to anything strange that you might see or hear, and notify authorities.

State Budget Disagreements Continue

The Legislative Conference Committees in both the

Senate their altering



and Assembly completed work in early March, after some of the cuts proposed

by Governor Brown. The cuts already agreed upon have dealt a huge blow to services to the poor, elderly and disabled in California.

As proposed by the Governor, a major budget assumption is the continuation of temporary taxes that were enacted in 2009 and due to expire June 30, 2011. The budget was to be voted upon the week of March 7. However, Republicans have demanded that Governor Brown commit to a number of reforms in return for their vote to put Tax Extensions on the June Ballot.

AAUW CA supports the Tax Extension, as well as a number of reforms, as outlined in AAUW CA□s Position Paper on the California Budget 2011-2012: However, proposed reforms require legal and financial analyses, discussion, and negotiation, thus taking time to implement. California requires revenues now, and if the Tax Extension is not on the ballot and not approved by voters, additional cuts of \$12 billion will be required. K-12 Education will be a major target for additional cuts, and result in even greater reductions in the quality of education in the state. A cuts-only approach to achieve a balanced budget is an unreasonable solution, and harmful to all state residents. All AAUW members should be concerned about the partisanship that is so divisive both in California and in Congress. Sign up for Action Alert on the website, and communicate with your elected representatives. Demand that they engage in reasonable dialogue and compromises that will

constructively move California forward!

The state Public Policy Priorities have been developed for 2011- 2013, and will be voted on at the AAUW CA Convention. The committee also reviewed over 70 bills in the current legislative session, and took positions on 45 of these that are related to the Priorities.
