
Human Trafficking Here and Around the World Sr. Caritas Foster, SHF

Human Trafficking or Trafficking in Persons is a modern-day form of slavery. Human Trafficking is defined as controlling a person through force, fraud or coercion—physical or psychological—to exploit the person for





criminal activity throughout the world.

Sister Caritas Foster is a member of the Sisters of the Holy Family. She currently serves on the Board of Directors for MISSSEY, a local organization that serves sexually exploited youth. Sister Caritas belongs to a coalition of religious communities standing against human trafficking, volunteers at Tri-Cities Homeless Shelter, and is an advocate for affordable housing.

New Federal Restrictions on Selling Children's Books

Ed. Note: the following excerpt is copied from a news brief sent from AAUW. It was intended primarily for branches that hold book sales as fundraisers. For the full story and sample letters please ask Susanne Rheingruber to email the brief to you. As a long time member of ALA, I have already written my letter and hope many of you will do the same.

Background

In response to media stories about lead and other toxins in children's toys, Congress adopted the "Consumer Product Safety Improvement Act" in 2008. The law seeks to lower the levels of dangerous toxins, such as lead, in products intended for children 12 years of age or younger. The Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), which regulates most consumer goods, was put in charge of enforcing this law. The CPSC announced that almost all products for children ages 12 or younger were covered by this law, *including books*. Under this interpretation, books are subject to the same testing standards as children's toys and clothing.

AAUW is lobbying Congress to pass legislation to end this restriction on children's books which have been repeatedly proven safe. This bill, H.R. 272, was introduced in January 2011 and would exempt books from the CPSC's new lead standards. Introduced by Rep. Jeff Fortenberry (R-NE), it has the support of both AAUW and the American Library Association. We will keep you posted on our progress in moving the legislation, and will look to you to provide your voice for its passage.
