If you joined us for our November general meeting,
you heard Assembly member Susan Bonilla's
informative talk regarding California's education budget
and the new common core program which is being
instituted in schools across California and the nation.
The initial common core program focuses on language
arts and mathematics, but as the chair of the Assembly
Select Committee on Increasing the Integration of
Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM),
Ms. Bonilla's goal is to eventually expand the program
to the area of science as well. Appreciation is extended
to our Program VPs, Harriett Burt and Elena Noble, for
arranging this timely program.

AAUW California is doing its own part in promoting STEM. Our highly successful Tech Trek program was designed for this very purpose: to foster interest in science, technology, engineering and math in middle school aged girls in the hopes that their interest will be sustained and lead to college pursuits in these fields. This program has been so well received that National is now promoting other states to follow our lead in establishing similar Tech Trek programs.

AAUW's roots go back to 1881 when Marion Talbot led 65 women college graduates to form the Association of Collegiate Alumnae. Over the years other collegiate women's groups joined forces and in 1921 this alliance became the American Association of University Women. Today over one hundred and fifty thousand members and supporters comprise AAUW. Like all organizations AAUW continues to strive not only to maintain that membership but to also enlarge its numbers. So in this "season of giving" why not consider the gift of an AAUW membership? We know how far women have come, but we also know how far we need to go. Equal pay, equal opportunities in education and the workplace, increased representation in government and leadership positions, even achieving the presidency of our country, are all goals still facing women of today.
