Legislative Priorities

The following are excerpts from AAUW Quick Facts: Federal Legislative Priorities for Women and Families in the 114<sup>th</sup> Congress, researched and written by Erin Prangley. These are some of the issues that AAUW will be focusing on during the 114<sup>th</sup> Congress. We thought it would be of interest to you.

Economic Security: "AAUW tracks wage gap data in all states and congressional districts and also supports legislation to close the wage gap. AAUW supports federal policies to update the Family and Medical Leave Act to further ensure paid leave and paid sick days. Many provisions of the Affordable Care Act benefitted women. It included better access to preventive care, expanded Medicaid and access to reproductive health care. AAUW supports legislation to keep these hard-fought gains for women's health."

Education: "AAUW supports a strong system of public education that promotes gender fairness, equity, and diversity. AAUW remains committed to ensuring strong academic principles and bias-free public education that closes the achievement gap for all children. AAUW maintains that all schools, including charter schools, should be held accountable for compliance with all civil rights laws, including Title IX. AAUW supports promoting and strengthening science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) education, especially for girls and other underrepresented groups."

"AAUW works to increase access to postsecondary education for all students and to ease student loan burdens." "Educational equity requires fair, responsive, fully developed campus sexual assault policies, knowledgeable administrators, and ultimately, an end to sexual violence on campuses. AAUW supports vigorous enforcement of the Clery Act and Title IX."

# Women's History is AAUW History is Women's History

Although studying Women's History should be a year-round activity, March is the month that is designated as such. Recalling this country's history it is easy to see how AAUW has been a leading force in research and legislation affecting the lives of its women:

**1777** - The original 13 states pass laws that prohibit women from voting. Abigail Smith Adams writes that women "will not hold ourselves bound by any laws which we have no voice."

**1869** - Susan Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton form the National Woman Suffrage Association with the primary goal to achieve voting rights for women through a Congressional amendment to the US Constitution.

**1881** - Since our founding in 1881, AAUW members have **examined and taken positions** on the fundamental issues of the day — educational, social, economic, and political.

**1905** - AAUW supports the **first federal pay equity legis-lation.** 

**1920** - **19th Amendment to the US Constitution** is ratified, granting women the right to vote.

**1971** - At the 1971 convention, AAUW members pass resolutions supporting the legalization of abortion and the Equal Rights Amendment.

**1975** - The AAUW **Action Fund Capitol Hill Lobby Corps** is formed to monitor congressional hearings and lobby for bills that match AAUW's legislative program.

**1993** - Through the hard work of the AAUW Lobby Corps, the **Family** Medical Leave Act passes.

**2009** - President Barack Obama signs the **Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay** Act

AAUW members and supporters worked tirelessly on this bill, calling, e-mailing, and meeting with their representatives and senators; writing letters to the editor; and spreading the word to their friends and family, and AAUW was in the room with Ledbetter when President Obama signed the bill into law.

# COMMUNITY COLLEGES TO OFFER FOUR YEAR DEGREES

Fifteen Community Colleges will now be able to offer four-year degree programs which will allow students to earn Bachelor Degrees.

This change in California law came as a result of Senate Bill 850, which loosens a long standing restriction on community colleges.

However, if you are planning to return to school to get another bachelors degree or if you are excited for a family member to earn a degree in this way, you had better read the small print.

The only degrees that can be offered at community colleges are those that are not offered at traditional four year colleges , specifically the California State Colleges and the U.C. System. Those to be offered are mostly vocational programs such as dental hygienist, respiratory therapist, sustainable facilities management, etc..

I guess this would be a case of good news/bad news.
