The applications are out for the NCCWSL grant at DVC. The Funds committee is looking forward to applications as great as last year's. From the Funds historical record: Two early AAUW fellowships supporting advanced degrees for women in science as well as the arts: **1920**: AAUW members contribute to a larger effort American journalist Marie Meloney aiming to purchase one gram of radium for Nobel laureate Marie Curie. The leftover funds go to an endowment that launches the Marie Curie Postdoctoral Fellowship and **1926**: The Margaret Maltby Endowment is established to honor Maltby, chair of the Committee on Fellowships and chair of the physics department at Barnard College. Maltby, a former AAUW European Fellow who studied at Gottingen University, also authored the History of Fellowships Awarded by AAUW, 1988-1929. The fellowship is open to any woman with a degree in the arts or sciences. Esther Caukin Brunauer, future secretary of the AAUW International Relations Committee, is the first Margaret Maltby Fellow. Mary Sylvia Isaacs Baldwin April 8, 1916~December 7, 2015 Los Gatos




Mary Sylvia Isaacs Baldwin, age 99, passed away peacefully on December 7, 2015. She was the last remaining family member of her generation. She will be missed at gatherings where she instilled in her children a love of family history and the value of education.

Mary was born in Baltimore, Maryland, the only child of John and Sylvia Isaacs. She grew up in San Diego and attended San Diego State for two years. She pledged a sorority and began some lifelong friendships. She then transferred to the University of California at Berkeley and graduated in 1937 with a major in Economics and a minor in History.

Mary worked as a secretary for the Home Owners' Loan Corporation and for the Shell Development Company in San Francisco. She married then-Major John Finley Baldwin at the Presidio in San Francisco in December, 1944. After the war and John's graduation from law school, the young family made their home in Martinez, California.

In 1954, when John was elected to the U.S. Congress, the family moved to the Washington, D.C. area and eventually bought a home in Arlington, Virginia. While Mary supported her husband in his political career, her priority was always being a fulltime homemaker to her daughters. She also enjoyed leading their Girl Scout troop. When her husband died of cancer in 1966, Mary moved the family back to Martinez. She was very involved in service organizations (Cal Alumni, AAUW, the P.E.O. Sisterhood and local historical societies) and the First Congregational Church. She loved to read and traveled extensively with college and local friends, visiting Europe, Scandinavia, Russia, Egypt, Israel, New Zealand, Canada and Guatemala. In 1998 Mary relocated to The Terraces of Los Gatos where she lived for the remainder of her life. Mary is survived by two daughters: Doris (Maurice) Moberg of Los Altos and Sylvia (Paul) Dilgard of Woodland; three grandchildren: Laura (Andrew) Hershberger and Craig and Diana Moberg; and two great-grandchildren: Isaac and Siena Hershberger. She is predeceased by her husband, Congressman John F. Baldwin, Jr., and their eldest daughter, Georgia. Mary was a loving, caring and very generous mother and grandmother, and she will be dearly missed.

Friends and family are invited to a memorial service at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, January 9, 2016, at the First Congregational Church, 1229 Court Street, Martinez. Hidden in Plain Sight: Human Trafficking in the Bay Area will be presented by the **Danville-Alamo-Walnut Creek** and the San Ramon Branches of AAUW. Learn about this modern form of slavery, what is being done to fight this crime, and what local agencies and non-profits are doing to rescue victims. **Find out what you can do to help!**January is Human Trafficking Awareness Month in Contra Costa County. Unfortunately, human trafficking is happening right here in our communities. Perhaps you read about the arrest last fall of a sex-trafficking ring based right here in San Ramon and Danville. California is one of the top four destination states for human trafficking, and the Bay Area is one of the top destinations in the entire country. Human trafficking disproportionately affects girls and women, which is why AAUW has focused on this issue during the last decade.

The Orinda-Moraga-Lafayette (OML) Branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) is offering merit-based scholarships to graduating senior women at Acalanes, Campolindo, and Miramonte High Schools. One \$5,000 and two \$1,000 scholarships are available to seniors who maintain at least a 3.0 GPA and are committed to community service.

Two steps are required to complete the application. First fill out the online application form at <a href="mailto:oml-ca.aauw.net/scholarships/highschool-application/">oml-ca.aauw.net/scholarships/highschool-application/</a>. Submit it online.

Second, mail in a packet, including two letters of recommendation and official transcript from the school, and the essay. Both the online application and mail in packet must be received by March 2, 2016.

### **Kaplan Practice SAT/ACT Test January**

It's January and back-to-the-books time. Before your 2016 calendar fills up, ask yourself: Is my student prepared for the new college entrance exams? There is a practice test that your student can take that will help you find the answer to that question, and it might be the best \$35 you spend.

The test is a product of Kaplan TEST PREP and is designed to high-light the test-taker's strengths and weaknesses. The American As-

sociation of University Women (AAUW) Scholarship Committee has scheduled two tests, one at Miramonte High School, Orinda, on January 30, 2016 and the other at Campolindo High School, Moraga, on February 20, 2016.

But that's not all. What makes this test so valuable is a week or so later, parents and students return to receive their scores and participate in an interpretive discussion.
