AAUW FUND

Harriett Burt and Helen Pereira, AAUW Fund VPs

The same very nice, very young (but not as young as I thought) hostess greeted me and immediately asked the manager to come forward. Iris and I completed our business with the news that our logo has already been sent to TJ's HQ for the tickets.... thank you, Reba.

As I thanked the hostess and turned to leave, she asked what AAUW was. So I told her about it from the beginning to now. Listing the programs that Tahoe Joe's has helped us support encouraging local middle school and community college young women to reach for the sky, I also described Start Smart. She was so excited she asked if she could join. I asked if she was in college because she looked 18 or 19 at the most. It turns out that she (Brooke to me by now) graduated from Mills College in June with a Pre-Med major and is applying to medical schools as I write. It also turns out that she liked what she heard about us and what we do so much that she would like to join! I am passing her contact information to Bea and Elva. Her enthusiasm about what AAUW does made me want to dance out to my car. However, I came down to earth when I realized I had told her about everything we do except Fund for crying out loud! So I whirled around and returned to tell her about that too. After all, Fund is the starting point for all we do today to help women to meet their potential!

A number of you have told me and others how delightful and impressive our Nickwhistler, Zuhal Rahmani, was at the Fall Brunch. You could see the Tech Trekkers following all she said, perhaps beginning to realize they could be Zuhal in another six years. She is thoughtful as well as she took the time to create an album for us and to bring 'souvenirs' of her adventure to the Fund committee members. My Tahoe Joe papers are in the University of Maryland folder as I speak! By the way, her mother, who was ill so could not come to the brunch, told us last spring that Zuhal means Shining Star in Afghani. Got that right!!

EDUCATION Gayle Duncan

In December of 2015, the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), was signed into law by President Obama. This law replaced No Child Left Behind. To address the problem of inequities in education, the U.S. Department of Education, proposed regulations to implement ESSA.

Included in the changes is a fiscal requirement that does not allow federal funds to replace state and local funds in low-income schools. In other words, the federal funds will supplement, not supplant (SNS), state and local funds.

Educators' feedback, influenced the new regulations, regarding the supplement not supplant (SNS) provision of ES-SA. The following revised proposals offer ways to meet ESSA's requirement for SNS: 1) Weighted student funding formula- Additional resources will be provided for students in areas of poverty, English Language Learners, and students with disabilities. Title 1 schools will receive all the funds that they are entitled to. 2) A formula that measures the sum of the number of personnel in the school, multiplied by the district's average salaries for each staff category, and the number of students in the school multiplied by the district's average per-pupil costs for non-personnel resources. 3) The state will develop an alternative, funds-based test, that is approved by a panel of expert peer reviewers, that is as rigid as the two options mentioned above; or 4) A method, the district selects, to ensure that per-pupil funding in all Title 1 schools, equals the average per-pupil funding in non-Title 1 schools in the district.

Thus, the Department of Education's goal, with these new provisions, is to provide guidelines so that funds will be distributed evenly within each district. In this way, all students will have their needs addressed, and will have an equal opportunity to learn in a meaningful way. Providing funding is just the beginning. Equally important is how the funds will be used to enrich the education of all students.

Lita Gloor-Little

I have taken the liberty to put together several quotes from some of the many AAUW mailings I, and probably you, have received. I think in this election year, these issues are extremely important to all women, regardless of their political affiliation. When we can have respectful dialogue with regard to the many issues we can make the changes we want to make.

"The American Association of University Women (AAUW) is hard at work every day to make sure women's voices are heard this historic election year. Many issues that affect women and families are at stake, including the gender pay gap, sexual assault and harassment, college affordability, and women's representation in leadership. It's unacceptable that women make up 51 percent of the population but only 19 percent of the U.S. Congress."

As to the above paragraph, it seems that we need to take some time and effort to get more women in politics and in public office throughout the nation.

"AAUW members know the fight for gender equality is anchored in centuries of struggle and continues today. Every day we are on the ground pushing action on issues like <u>equal pay</u>, <u>paid leave</u>, <u>Title IX</u>, and <u>voting rights</u>. As we tick down the days until the 2016 election, AAUW members will remind candidates and elected officials that while we have come a long way since our right to vote was guaranteed, we still have much more to do."²

In this election year it is important that we think about how we vote and why we're voting. AAUW Nationally is working to register new voters and to get women to the polls. I would like to point out that the new president will have at least 1 Supreme Court Justice to nominate, and possibly more.

"From our paychecks and health care services to educational funding and campus safety, there is so much at stake each time women head to the polls. The AAUW Action Fund *Congressional Voting Record* is yet another tool to hold our legislators accountable on issues that directly affect women and families."

And remember: When women vote, we change the conversation!"3

I like to remember this quote from the Women's Movement: the political is personal. This affects all of us.


