
We and our stalwart Fund Committee want to thank you all for supporting our projects and for contributing generously to the annual Fall Brunch "Ask Letter". Along with other contributions made by Branch members, Pleasant Hill-Martinez ranks very near the top of the California list including branches that have more members and resources than we do.

Shia Stennis is getting ready to leave for Baltimore as our third National Conference of College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL). Our first, Brenda Ruiz, will be graduating from UC Berkeley in June. Zuhal Rahmani is finishing her junior year at Davis. Shia will enter UC Berkeley in the fall. We look forward to meeting her at the Fall Brunch.

This column started two years ago with Fund Facts going back to 1888. We'll exit stage right with a few more Fund Facts for us to be aware of.

In 1980, the Educational Foundation programs, awards, and grants exceeded \$1 million in one year for the first time. (Currently it's \$3 million annually). Another milestone passed that year with the award of more than 100 American Fellowships. In 1987 members raised more than \$235,000 to establish the Judith Resnik American Fellowship Endowment, a memorial to the 1975 American Fellow who was among the astronauts killed in the 1986 Challenger space shuttle disaster. In 1989 the Eleanor Roosevelt Fund was established expanding AAUW's education focus to girls in grades K-12 and now funding important research on education opportunities for girls and women as well. Thanks to the increase in grants and awareness raising like Start Smart and programs like Tech Trek, AAUW is the outstanding force nationally in raising expectations and opportunities for girls and women in fields long restricted by gender.

TECH TREK TIDINGS

Our branch continues to show tremendous support in raising money for Tech Trek, sending five local girls to camp. We had start-up funds from the previous year and have money in the bank for next year. We received a generous \$2000 grant from Shell, a wonderful community sponsor, in November 2016. Thank you for your contributions to keep this amazing program funded. Just so you know, Tech Trek, a week-long academic residential camp features hands-on activities in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM). The camp is June 18 – 24 at Sonoma State University. It costs \$1000 per camper this year.

This year the Tech Trek committee had a challenge in selecting five out of twenty four applicants from our four middle schools. We are excited to present our 2017 campers: Deandra Lara and Mia Puljiz from Martinez Junior High, Elanor Schichnes from Pleasant Hill Middle, Kira Funk from Sequoia Middle, and Jasmine Kimbrough from Valley View Middle School. We look forward to introducing them at our end of the year brunch on Saturday, May 20th. I hope you'll plan on attending so you can see for yourself these young women who show interest and promise in math and science for the future.

These seventh grade girls will have an opportunity to meet the other campers from neighboring AAUW branches at our Ice Cream Social on June 11, at the Pacheco Community Center. They have also promised to attend our Fall Brunch in September to share their fabulous experiences at Tech Trek camp.

I would like to extend a special thank you to my co-chair Trinka March and our committee, Sherrie Moore, Helen Pereira, Nancy Hobert, Penny Harris, Claudia Bass. These women have been extremely valuable in guiding me though my first year as co-chair, answering my questions, working on timelines, interviewing and selecting our campers. EDUCATION Gayle Duncan

Students at Park Middle School, in Antioch, are using Yoga and breathing techniques to maintain calm on campus. The two-pronged approach was adopted by the school principal, John Jimno, last year. The school has approximately 1,063 students. The two main goals of this program is "to retain teachers who were struggling to manage unruly students and enable adolescents to keep strong emotions in check." These tactics are being introduced to all three grade levels, in stages. Each day, several hundred students spend 15 minutes learning to regulate their breathing, perform yoga movements and focus on the present. Each student does this twice a week. These methods are also known as practicing "mindfulness." The students now have tools to communicate what they need to keep their emotions in check. Bidyut Bose is the founder and executive director of Niroga Institute, a nonprofit providing the training. Knowing breathing techniques can aid students to become more tranquil. Many students are confused as to why they are upset and have no idea how to calm themselves down. The students count as they breathe in and out, resulting in a slower heart rate that allows them to focus. The modulated breathing also is used before students take exams to relieve anxiety and relax students after Physical Education classes. Students are instructed to concentrate on the moment at hand instead of worrying about the past or what may happen in the future. John Jimno sounds chimes every afternoon, telling students to "Just remember to hold onto that last bit of sound. This brings you focus and helps you to concentrate." Jimno then conducts breathing drills for several minutes. One of the portable classrooms is named the "wellness room", where students practice Yoga moves. Students can go to this room if they need a brief break from conflict in the classroom. Some students stop in every morning if they have had a history of referrals from the Principal's office. Students visited the wellness room 1,518 times in nine weeks last fall. As of March 31st, 2017, there have been only 120 suspensions, compared to 522 for the same length of time last year. The Antioch School Board has approved \$1,500 to provide similar training to Belshaw Elementary, and the district introduced "Tool Box" - 12 behaviors recommended for students to practice. Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports, PBIS, has been used throughout the district for the past two years. Another program, "restorative justice," is being used to help students reconcile their conflicts with each other. These various programs seem to be reaping many benefits for the teachers and the students. The students are learning strategies that will help them throughout their school years and beyond.

PROGRAM NOTES

Because PH-MTZ branch (not chapter) AAUW members have many interests, our programs at general meetings cover a wide range of topics. Not every program is of interest to every member, however, though we do have the "faithful" who attend all meetings. Not often, but some programs are "duds" and some others are surprises, and exceed what we expected...and that's great. Most years, our January Soup Supper is our best attended program, and we have had some really good speakers on international topics.

As your program Vice Presidents in 2016-17 we have a program evaluation sheet and would like your opinion and comments. It will be available at our May general meeting on May 20 or you can request one. It will be helpful in planning programs for next year.

PUBLIC POLICY

Due to pressing personal matters, I haven't been able to put anything in the newsletter for the past 2 months. Here are some of the articles posted by Linda Maatz, our National Public Policy Director.

As our Mission Statement says Advancing equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research. The American Association of University Women (**AAUW**) is the nation's leading voice promoting equity and education for women and girls. ... Cheers to an inclusive Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act. In that vein, I am truly aware that we all hold a variety of political opinions, I am trying to present a balanced view of the public policies.

For those of us who have paid off student loans, those of us who helped put children and grandchildren through college, Secretary DeVos' decision will directly affect us.

Secretary Betsy DeVos Rescinds Obama-era Student Loan Protections

On April 11, Education Secretary Betsy DeVos signed an order turning over key parts of the Obama-era plan to streamline the student lending system and to protect student borrowers. A major piece of the Obama administration's guidance struck down by DeVos states the Department should strongly consider a company's track record when choosing student loan vendors and should not choose companies who have demonstrated poor service or other issues in the past. Nearly two dozen state attorney generals spoke out against DeVos' move to revoke this federal guidance to increase consumer protections in student loan servicing. In their letter, the attorneys general told Secretary DeVos that her decision "to roll back essential protections imperils millions of student loan borrowers and families." The Obama administration cut out private banks and lenders as student debt collectors, as they profited greatly from student loans, and put the federal government in charge of lending. The Department then contracted out to private firms for the services and put strict safeguards in place to protect borrowers. Overturning the guidance allows for contracting companies that have historically mistreated consumers, which is troubling for the future of student loans.

When visiting a Virginia elementary school this week, <u>Secretary of Education Betsy DeVos said</u>, "The role [of ensuring civil rights] is a very important one, and it really is to help ensure that every child has a safe and nurturing environment in which to learn. It is a very broad goal, but a very important one." That same week, the U.S. Department of Education <u>announced</u> the appointment of an acting assistant secretary for the Office for Civil Rights (OCR) who, as a nonpermanent employee, will not be subject to Senate scrutiny despite some concerning positions on Title IX and other civil rights laws. AAUW <u>looks forward to working</u> with OCR to ensure that a qualified nominee for assistant secretary is fully assessed and will work for all Americans, regardless of gender, race, ethnicity, religion, disability, sexual orientation, or gender identity.
