Leslie Rueb December 11, 1943 - August 2, 2017 Martinez Forty-Seven Year Resident of Martinez

On Wednesday August 2nd, Leslie Rueb passed away peacefully in her sleep. Leslie is survived by her loving family including her three sons, Greg, Brent and Mark, daughters-in-law, Sharon and Lynn, her six grandchildren: Lauren, Justin, Catherine, Griffin, Will and Mia and her sister Carol and her brother Lanny.

Leslie Rueb was born to Merle and Eileen Olson in Cloquet, Minnesota and raised on Hi-Lo Acres farm in Carlton, Minnesota. In her youth, she was an active participant in the 4H Club, raising

animals and competing in County Fairs. She also enjoyed hay riding, ice skating, swimming in lakes and traveling with her family. She attended Blackhoof Valley Elementary School (a one-room school house) from grades 1 through 8. She graduated from Barnum High School ('61) and then obtained her Bachelor's Degree in Education specializing in Kindergarten/Primary Education and a Minor in Art from the <u>University of Minnesota</u>, Duluth ('65).

While in college, Leslie was truly blessed to meet the man of her dreams, Harold David Rueb. They met in 1963 at The Officer's Club while Dave was in the US Air Force stationed in Duluth, MN. After a two-year courtship, they were married on April 10, 1965 in Minnesota. Together they blazed a trail to Alaska while Dave continued to serve in the Air Force at Elmendorf AFB in Anchorage. Upon Dave's honorable discharge, they moved to Berkeley so he could pursue his Master's Degree in Structural Engineering at U.C. Berkeley ('69). In 1970, they moved to Martinez and raised their three boys. Leslie subsequently attended St. Mary's College in Moraga in pursuit of her Master's Degree in Education. For approximately 15 years, Leslie was a substitute and full-time elementary school teacher both in Anchorage and Martinez. She primarily taught Music and Kindergarten. She lived in Martinez until her passing, which amazingly was on the same day as Dave's passing 8 years ago.

Leslie's passion was her family. She dedicated her time, love and undivided attention to her children and grandchildren. Leslie was known for her huge heart and generous donation of her time with a never-ending supply of energy. Over four decades, Leslie endured three separate open heart surgeries, demonstrating her incredible strength and fortitude. Leslie had a passion for the Holidays with Thanksgiving and Christmas being her favorites. As a child, she marveled in the lights, decorations and spirit of Christmas and this translated into a huge collection of over a thousand Santa Clause antiques and unique collectibles. Leslie's other passions included music, art, painting, BUNCO, attending the ballet and Warriors' games, as a season ticket holder since the mid 80's.

Leslie devoted much of her life to charitable organizations including P.E.O., P.T.A., and the Martinez Historical Society. She also served as a Cub Scout Den Leader and Band Mother for her three boys. Her generosity and spirit blessed and enriched everyone she had contact with throughout her incredible life.

Her favorite quotes were – "We grow old too soon and too late smart", "Live each day to the fullest and make memories", "You Betcha", "Faith is seeing a rainbow in each tear" and "Laughter is good medicine."

A public viewing was held on Tuesday August 8th at the Redwood Chapel at Oakmont Memorial Park, 2099 Reliez Valley Road, Lafayette. Funeral/graveside services were held on Wednesday August 9th also at Oakmont Memorial Park, followed by a celebration of her life at the Contra Costa Country Club.

Yvonne Patton Cottrell, born June 9, 1931 in Delta, Colorado passed away on August 9, 2017. Yvonne is survived by her three sons and daughters-in-law, Pat and Camilla, Gregg and Melanie, and Karl and Diane. She was blessed with 16 grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren.

Yvonne was raised on her family's fruit ranch on Rogers Mesa near Hotchkiss, Colorado. She graduated in 1952 from the University of Colorado, Boulder, with a degree in Education. It was while at CU she met Glenn and they were married in Hotchkiss on August 24, 1952.

Yvonne and Glenn moved to Martinez in 1953. Yvonne taught first grade for one year prior to the birth of their first son, Pat. Yvonne, Glenn and Pat moved to their newly built home in Alhambra Valley the day Gregg was born in 1956. Soon Karl and Karen were joyfully added to the

family. These were happy years for Yvonne, raising their children in the beautiful surroundings in Alhambra Valley, making many life-long friends.

During her 62 years in Martinez, Yvonne was extremely active in many philanthropic groups. She served in multiple leadership roles with P.E.O, AAUW, and The Women's Fellowship of the United Church of Christ. She served on the Contra Costa Grand Jury in 1994-1995, Briones Park Annexation Committee and was the 1992 Martinez Woman of the Year. Yvonne was a strong supporter and volunteer for numerous school and community projects while her children attended school in Martinez, always there for their concerts, track meets, football games and music recitals.

Yvonne was an accomplished seamstress, quilter and knitter. All of her kids and grandkids will always cherish the heirloom Christmas stockings she lovingly made for each of them. She enjoyed gardening, cooking, reading, playing bridge, Mah Jongg and any social outing with friends.

EDUCATION Gayle Duncan

Oakland Unified has introduced a computer game that helps students learn math in a fun way. Playing the computer game, students solve puzzles to help JiJi, an animated penguin that appears across the screen. The program is called Spatial-Temporal Math or ST Math. When the students play ST Math games, they get excited about math, and are learning. The students are able to draw connections between real world problems and the games they are playing. Math is taught without the use of words, symbols, or numbers to students in Pre-K through Algebra 1. Numbers and symbols are used later in the games. The program has been especially effective with second language learners, students with some disabilities, and visual learners. Oakland schools, as well as more than 1,300 schools in California, and 3,281 schools in 45 states are using ST Math. Six hundred thousand students login every school year, in California alone, making up half of the 1 million students that use the program nationwide. MIND Research Institute, was created in 1998, by three University of California researchers. ST Math was based on studies that showed the brain's spatial temporal reasoning ability allows students to learn math concepts visually. By using images and animation, the computer program explains basic concepts like addition and subtraction to younger students, and complex problems like Algebra to older students. For example, fourth graders learn that one-third is more than one-fifth by showing a whole divided into three parts, compared to five parts. New games have been added to reflect the Common Core standards. The program also reinforces mathematical practices standards, including staying with a task until it is completed. The students respond to the program because it is like a game. Once students have learned a concept, JiJi, the penguin, appears and moves to the next game level. When a student answers incorrectly, the computer shows them why their solution didn't work, and has them try again. If the student still has difficulty, a red square appears on the screen, alerting the teacher that help is needed. Recent research showed that scores of 3rd through 5th graders, who met or exceeded math standards, on the 2015-2016 Smarter Balanced tests, was 5.4% higher than in schools that did not use the program. The students were using the program 90 minutes per week. The ST Math program does not replace district curriculum, but supplements it. There were a few negatives expressed by students. One, they have to ask the teacher to let them skip ahead to the next concept and two, they have been frustrated by no instructions and having to start over when they answer incorrectly. MIND recommends that the program be used 60 to 90 minutes a week to get the maximum benefit, as well as keeping up with the math curriculum.

FUND FACTS

The Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF), as you know, is a part of AAUW Fund. Recently, you may have noted in the news the death of Betty Dukes, a gender equity proponent.

Dukes lived in Antioch and worked for Walmart. She was the lead plaintiff in a class action suit filed in the U.S. District Court for No. California against Walmart. The suit alleged that women employees were denied advancement and training opportunities, paid less than men for the same or comparable work, steered to lower-paying departments, subjected to a sexually hostile work environment and retaliated against when they attempted to address sex discrimination. The case was argued before the U. S. Supreme Court on March 29, 2011.

AAUW representatives were with Dukes and other plaintiffs the night before the hearing. In addition to providing financial support, AAUW issued press releases, attended the hearing and co-led a rally in support of Dukes and other women at Walmart.

Even though the Supreme Court rejected the suit, please remember Betty Dukes and her fight for gender equality when you think of the your annual donation to Fund and its many entities.

SAM Program Suzanne Mesetz

The SAM Program (Study Art and Music) at Fair Oaks Elementary School, is based on the FAME Program (Fine Arts and Music Education) that was used at Pleasant Hill Elementary School about 15 years ago when my grandchildren attended and I volunteered. I used FAME as a basis for SAM, and added more contemporary art and music, while keeping the classics. I have never been a teacher, but I love researching the artists and musicians and finding out what their lives were like. My experience is that of a grandma, wanting to enrich children's lives.

I spoke at the teachers' meeting about 2 weeks ago, telling them we were going to resume SAM. I believe it hasn't been activated for the last year or two. My goal is to do 5 programs, but 3 is more realistic. I need help from at least 2 volunteers per program. I love doing this activity, and I think you will, too. Past programs have included Duke Ellington and Jackson Pollock, as well as Chopin and Ravel. We have often done folk music and quilting during Black History Month.

Since starting the SAM program, at Marilyn Tubbs' urging, we received a grant and a storage closet. Quite heady!!

Another activity is the student store. Small items are in the store as rewards for various good behaviors demonstrated by the students. I believe Clint Tubbs ran that and he was marvelous. I asked Mr. Pierce who runs it now, and he said that he did, with some help, about once month. We need some volunteers to take over that activity as well, perhaps once a week or every two weeks. The students really seem to enjoy it.

I also asked them to let me know what they needed and that we would try to accommodate them. I am quite the scavenger, using freecycle and other means. I recall when I was at the school before they needed wipes for the desks, and socks to wipe off the white boards. Often, the classroom is lacking a dictionary.

Also, the patches of dirt between the rows of classrooms are arid and sad. I will find out if that is a summer thing or year round thing. Perhaps we could do some sprucing up. The patches seem to be about 30" x 30".

I find it tremendously exciting to work with this school and try to give the students what schools in affluent areas already give their students. Please contact me to help out.

Public Policy Matters!

Can you remember the day you first learned about AAUW? It may not be as imbedded a memory as "I remember what I was doing when Kennedy was shot", but if you think back you might remember what that special thing was that made you think —"Yes — I want to be a part of that!" Was it the desire to join the fight to help all women achieve economic self-sufficiency? Or maybe it was the idea of finding ways to guarantee equality, individual rights and social justice for the underserved in your community that got your juices flowing. How about playing a role in ensuring legislation that protects women's reproductive rights? Any of this sound familiar?

Now, here you are, 2 or 5 or 10 years and 120 bridge games, or lunches, or book discussions later ... and public policy is just that report you listen to each month from your branch PP Chair. Now we public policy nerds enjoy our interest groups and social activities as much as anyone, don't get us wrong. Worse than being merely overly burdensome for one person is the fact that there is so much that is left undone – one person can only do so much. And there is so much that still needs to be done. We are still fighting for equal pay for equal work; still being denied promotions and access to power; still facing workplace policies that make it harder on women than men to balance life/work responsibilities; still watching our female athletes being denied equal access on the playing fields and in coaching positions; still watching state-after-state pass laws restricting our access to safe, effective family planning methods of our choice; still afraid of sexual violence on campus, and domestic violence in the home, and physical violence in the military.

Any of these making you mad? Are you ready to join the chorus and declare "we're not going to just keep taking it?" Your State Public Policy Committee wants to remind you that Public Policy *Still* Matters, and encourages you to contact your branch PP Chair today to ask — "what can I do to make a difference?" Sometimes all that's needed is just an extra pair of hands. You don't need to be an attorney or a political science major to do public policy work — just passion and your gift of time.
